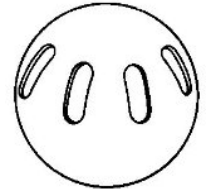
RECREATION

EAST-WEST COMMITTEE

The East-West Committee was formed in June 2007 to investigate interaction between property owners around the whole of Lake Hayward. This is our fifth year operating, and we have accomplished a lot. But the possibilities going forward are much greater. We are now at the point at which we could formalize our organization, name it appropriately, and address how we want to move forward, including how we could be connected to POALH. We want to have an open discussion of this at the upcoming meetings. Your input is important.

This summer two themes of interest to all Lake Hayward residents will be addressed at our first event, on **Saturday July 14th at 10am at the Pavilion**. First there will be a report on the mapping of the buffer plantings of the lake-shore done last summer by the Eightmile River Wild and Scenic Coordinating Committee and a student volunteer, and the subsequent grant-subsidized offering in late April by the Connecticut River Coastal Conservation District for "Buffer in a Bag" packets at a reduced price. Further education on the importance of plantings to filter run-off into the lake will be included.

Following this presentation, a member of the Chatham Health District will be on hand to explain the recent letters we received regarding the applications for pump-out certifications for our septic systems. People are still concerned and confused as to their status, and many residents haven't been able to secure the certificate indicating their septic system has been inspected and is in good order.

In both these situations Lake Hayward has been singled out as a test area, and we are therefore in the right to ask them to come out to address our concerns and answer our questions. The more people, the better. Refreshments will be on hand—come down and participate!

There will be a second presentation in early August (date to be announced) in which we hope to host members of the Board of Selectmen and Board of Finance to address issues of concern to our area residents.

CONTRADANCE

On Sunday, July 1st (3-6pm), Lake Hayward will host a Contradance at the Pavilion.

What is it?

Contradance is folk-style type of dance in which couples dance in parallel lines opposite—or "contra to"—their partners. During a Contradance, a "caller" guides dancers through a variety of dances. In response to the caller's instructions, each couple interacts with the couple next to them to form a four-person "set" and each set interacts with the sets on either side of them. Over the course of a dance each couple moves up and down the hall, interacting with every other couple in their multi-set "line." Contra is danced to Celtic, Jazz, Blues, and all sorts of other music.

History

Sometimes described as New England folk dance, Contradance dates back to the end of the 17th century, when English country dances were adapted by the French who named them *contra-dance* or *contredanse*. Contradances were fashionable in the US until the mid-19th century, when square dances and couple dances (such as the waltz and polka) became more popular. In the early 1980s, the Peterborough Town House in Peterborough, New Hampshire started a Saturday Contradance and the trend again spread across the nation.

Who can do it?

One of the great things about Contradancing is that no experience is necessary. Before beginning a new dance, the caller teaches everyone the steps contained in the sequence. Contradances are easy to learn, with only about 20 basic moves. Also, over the course of a dance, you will interact with everyone in the set including, but not limited to, your "partner," so don't be concerned if you aren't bringing a partner to the dance. We hope to see you at the Pavilion on July 1st!

BEACH RULES - (PLEASE INFORM GUESTS AND RENTERS OF THESE RULES)

1. Parents or chaperones are responsible for their child's safety and their child's actions at all times.
2. Children cannot be left at the beach unattended.
3. Infants must be in leak-proof ("swimmie") diapers at all times.
4. Fishing within 100 feet of the swimming area is strictly prohibited.
5. Use of boats and watercraft within the swimming area or within 100 feet of rafts is prohibited.
6. When passing a beach area, dogs must be on a leash. Dogs are never allowed on the beach.
7. There is no swimming after 11pm.
8. All trash and cigarette butts must be removed from the beach and be properly disposed of. Glass containers are prohibited on Association property.
9. Use of the beach area is limited to Association members and their guests.

SEPTIC MAINTAINENCE

Septic systems are like automobiles. They need periodic inspections and proper maintenance to continue working properly. Also, they cannot be overtaxed without the owner suffering consequences such as repair or replacement bills.

What to put in, what to keep out

- Direct all wastewater from your home into the septic tank. This includes all sink, bath, shower, toilet, washing machine and dishwasher wastewaters. Any of these waters can contain disease-causing microorganisms or environmental pollutants.
- Conserve water to avoid overloading the septic system. Be sure to repair any leaky faucets or toilets. Use low-flow fixtures.
- Do not use caustic drain openers for a clogged drain. Instead, use boiling water or a drain snake to open clogs.
- Do not use septic tank additives, commercial septic tank cleansers, yeast, sugar, etc. These products are not necessary and some may be harmful to your system.
- Use commercial bathroom cleaners and laundry detergents in moderation. Many people prefer to clean their toilets, sinks, showers, and tubs with a mild detergent or baking soda.

When to have your septic tank pumped

You should have your septic system inspected every 1-2 years by a professional and your tank pumped when necessary. The septic tank traps the solids in the wastewater and should be checked to determine whether or not it is time for it to be pumped out. The absorption field should be checked for sogginess or ponding, which indicates im-

proper drainage, a clogged system, or excessive water use. The presence of damp or soggy areas or odors may indicate a leak in the system.

Reducing the flow of wastewater

Generally, the more people, the more water will flow through the system. However, the use of water conservation devices such as low-flow toilets, washing machines or shower fixtures greatly reduces the amount of wastewater thus prolonging the life of your septic system. For example, up to 53 gallons of water are discharged into your system with each load of laundry. If several loads are done in one day, it can put considerable stress on your system. A better practice would be to space your laundry washing throughout the week.

Absorption field

An absorption field generally does not require any maintenance. However, to protect and prolong the life of the absorption field, follow these simple rules:

- Plant only grass over and near your septic system. Roots from nearby trees or shrubs may clog and damage the absorption field.
- Do not drive or park over any part of your septic system. This can compact the soil and crush your system.
- Keep roof drains, basement sump pump drains, and other rainwater or surface water drainage systems away from the absorption field. Flooding of the absorption field with excessive water will keep the soil from naturally cleansing the wastewater, which can lead to groundwater and/or nearby surface water pollution.

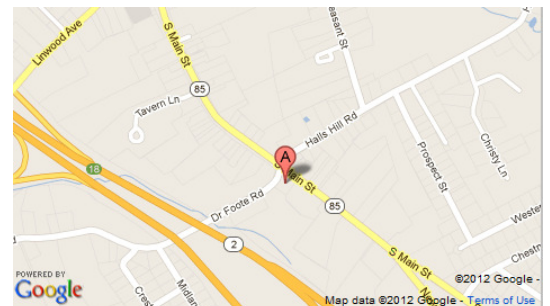
