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SHERLOCK HOLMES RETURNS

Sherlock Holmes returns to Gillette Castle this summer thanks to a grant from Connecticut Humanities.

Gillette Castle, located at 67 River Road in East Haddam, was the home of William Gillette, a famous Victorian actor, director, and playwright who created the detective Sherlock Holmes character for stage.

Gillette Castle State Park visitors are invited to become the studio audience for a live-action radio drama "Sherlock Holmes and the Adventure of the Speckled Band." Free performances will be held twice daily on Saturday and Sunday afternoons until August 11. Four actors will portray all the characters and sound effects, using the actual 1930 script that William Gillette used for the first-ever Sherlock Holmes radio broadcast. The 30-minute shows, presented at 1:00pm and 3:00pm, will be held outdoors just steps from the Castle. The public is invited to sit on the bleachers or bring blankets or chairs. (If raining, the performance will be cancelled.)



HISTORICAL FILES

The Dark Day

Connecticut is no stranger to epic natural events. Since 2010, the state has had an earthquake, a blizzard, a hurricane, a Frankenstorm, a freak October snowstorm, floods and several tornadoes. It seems that the "Storm of the Century" hits us once a year.

One of the more unusual occurrences, however, is known simply as "The Dark Day." On the morning of May 19, 1780, the sky grew so dark all over most of New England and parts of the Northeast that "everything bore the gloom and aspect of night," according to *Our First Century*, (1876) by Richard Miller Devens. The darkness became no-



ticeable a little before eleven o'clock. About noon it became necessary to light candles, and these were needed through the remainder of the day. Many wondered if it was a sign from God.

As it turns out, the darkness was the result of a Canadian forest fire, compounded by a thick fog and cloud cover. In 2008, researchers examining tree rings in the Algonquin highlands of southern Ontario discovered evidence of a massive fire that had occurred there in 1780. Great columns of smoke wafted into the upper atmosphere, which affected the sky hundreds of miles away in New England. It's a phenomena that has also been observed in the wake of large-scale natural disasters such as volcanic eruptions.

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
BEACH RULES - (PLEASE INFORM GUESTS AND RENTERS OF THESE RULES)

- 1. Parents or chaperones are responsible for their child's safety and their child's actions at all times.
- 2. Children cannot be left at the beach unattended.
- 3. Infants must be in leak-proof ("swimmie") diapers at all times.
- 4. Fishing within 100 feet of the swimming area is strictly prohibited.
- Use of boats and watercraft within the swimming area or within 100 feet of rafts is prohibited.
- 6. When passing a beach area, dogs must be on a leash. Dogs are never allowed on the beach.
- 7. There is no swimming after 11pm.
- 8. All trash and cigarette butts must be removed from the beach and be properly disposed of. Glass containers are prohibited on Association property.
- 9. Use of the beach area is limited to Association members and their guests.
- 10. Cars parking in a beach parking area must display a POALH parking sticker or a guest pass.
