I do not feel business should be conducted in the president's message but recognize the newsletter is a convenient way to tell you what is happening in our community. My stewardship report in last week's newsletter generated a lot of passionate concern regarding the one-foot reserve. Many legacy families are quite familiar with this and have communicated their knowledge and concern about the reserve. Other Association members have no idea what I am talking about.

Frankly, I was not familiar with

the one-foot reserve until the Zawistowskis brought it to my attention. Thank you Gary and Sandy, especially for the documents you've provided. Regarding a connecting driveway at the end of Sunset Road, the Town of East Had-dam owns Sunset Road and has told the adjoining landowner that he cannot connect a driveway to the road without first obtaining approval from the Association and from the town itself. I believe a fence will be erected by the landowner across the road based on this directive from the Town. I am personally monitoring this issue and will make sure the Association is not violated.

The one-foot reserve or "buffer" was established in the original de-

veloper's plans and is shown in the original land maps completely surrounding the Association boundaries. The intent of the reserve is to stop expansion of the Association without the memberships' approval. In other words, adjoining properties cannot consider themselves part of the Association nor build or connect driveways into the Association area. Believe me when I say this is a good thing and I fully support this concept.

Presently, the Board is researching the one-foot reserve to ensure that any action we take and any policies we formulate regarding the reserve are proper and legal. We have found conflicting information in maps and deeds and are trying to establish proper guidelines based on today's legal interpretations regarding reserved land. I thank those who have called me and provided me with old meeting minutes and newsletters regarding actions taken in the past toward the reserve. The key words here are "in the past," but this is important information so that we can try to maintain tradition. Court decisions constantly

Let's clear the air: No-smoking rule on beaches in effect in 2016

The POALH Board took up the matter of smoking on Association properties at our meeting July 29.

The subject had previously been discussed in late 2010 after

Deborah Taylor obtained more than 20 signatures on a petition requesting the ban.

In 2010, the Board did not pursue the issue. At the June 2015 Association Meeting over-

whelming support for a ban was tallied in a straw vote. Consequently, based on membership desire, the Board has passed a regulation banning smoking on Association properties.

Public Safety Update: During August's dog days, it's important to stay hydrated

Our beaches are one of the main reasons why we all love Lake Hayward, but spending time in the sun can lead to unexpected consequences. Did you know that dehydration is often the underlying cause of sickness and accidents on lakes? Dehydration can occur more quickly in infants, children and the elderly, but anyone can suffer. Follow these tips to stay hydrated:

- Drink eight to 10 eight-ounce glasses of water daily
- Increase water intake during extreme heat, high humidity or activity
- Avoid caffeinated or alcoholic beverages (which dehydrate you)
- Protect your skin: wear sunscreen and protective clothing
- Reduce activity during the hottest part of the day (10 a.m. to 3 p.m.)
- Stay out of the sun during the hottest part of the day
- Check the color of your urine: it should be pale yellow, like the color of straw. If it is dark,



drink more water.

Some symptoms of dehydration include:

- Headache
- Dry mouth
- Thirst
- Concentrated, dark yellow urine or no urine
- No wet diapers for three hours in an infant

Increase your water intake during extreme heat, high humidity or activity.

- Lightheadedness or dizziness upon standing
- Increased heart rate
- Fatigue
- Muscle cramps
- Shriveled and dry skin that doesn't "bounce back" when pinched in a fold
- Lack of tears

If you become dehydrated:

- Stop activity, rest
- Get out of direct sunlight
- Drink 64 ounces of cool liquids over the next two to four hours

Seek medical attention if you or someone you are with are dizzy, confused, or don't respond to rehydration efforts. Let's make sure that dehydration doesn't put a damper on our Lake Hayward fun!

Monday garbage pickup continues until Sept. 8

All-Waste Control will collect trash and recyclables twice a week (Monday and Friday) through Sept. 8. The Town of East Haddam has implemented "single stream recycling" so it is no longer necessary to separate the various recyclables into separate containers and/or put them out on separate days. All recyclables can be combined and placed into a single container and put out with your regular trash. We must recycle:

1. Glass and metal food and beverage containers (rinsed); lids go in trash

(No broken glass, mugs, windowpanes, ceramics, light bulbs, mirrors, dishes or tempered glass)

2. Plastic containers Nos. 1 through 7 (rinsed); lids go in trash

3. Newspaper, magazines, cereal/pasta boxes, milk and juice cartons, junk mail (No phone books, wax- or plastic-coated cardboard, soiled newspaper or magazines, books, plastic (Tyvek) envelopes)

4. Cardboard (broken down) (No wax coated boxes, soiled boxes, pizza boxes)

Please place your trash in a covered container if it will be outside at night.

PAYMENT OF PROPERTY TAXES

All persons liable to pay real estate taxes to the Property Owners' Association of Lake Hayward as levied on the October 1, 2014 Grand List are hereby notified that the taxes are due and payable on July 1, 2015 at the mill rate of 3.50. The taxes will become delinquent on August 3, 2015 if not paid by this date. Delinquent tax bills shall be subject to interest of 1.5 percent per month reverting to the due date, July 1, 2015. The minimum interest charge is \$2. All persons in the Tax District who do not receive a tax bill should call the Tax Collector at 860-295-8769 to obtain their bill before the end of the grace period, August 3, 2015. Failure to receive a property tax bill does not invalidate the payment of the tax or related delinquent interest charge if not paid by August 3, 2015. Tax payments shall be made by mail to Tax Collector, Property Owners' Association of Lake Hayward, Post Office Box 230, Colchester, CT 06415.

Lake quality: A look at the water-monitoring program and its recent progress

The most important asset to our Lake Hayward community is, of course, the lake itself. We enjoy it in so many ways, whether swimming, fishing, boating, ice skating or simply admiring its beauty ... you name it and someone is enjoying it in one or many ways.

To monitor what is happening in our lake, the Lake Quality Improvement Committee (LQIC) expanded its monitoring program in 2015. Below is an overview of the LQIC monitoring program:

- **Total Phosphorus:** Monitoring started in 2015 for Total Phosphorus in the lake. Water samples were taken by LQIC members both just below the surface and also a meter off the bottom of the deepest area of the lake. The samples were then brought to the lab at the UCONN Center for Environmental Sciences for analysis. Understanding Total Phosphorus levels is important since even a modest increase in phosphorus, under the right conditions, can set off a whole chain of undesirable events including accelerated plant growth, algae blooms, low dissolved oxygen and even the death of certain fish and other aquatic animals. There are a variety of sources of

phosphorus, including fertilizers, failing septic systems and build up of leaves and muck in the lake.

- **Chlorophyll a:** Also started in 2015 is monitoring for the presence of chlorophyll a (active chlorophyll) in the lake. Measurement of chlorophyll a provides an indication of the amount of algae and phytoplankton in the lake, excessive amounts of which are bad for several reasons. This sample also was analyzed at the UConn lab. Total phosphorus and chlorophyll a samples are taken several times during the lake season.

- Since 2000 the lake has been monitored in the Spring and Fall for water clarity through use of a Secchi disk. While performed in the past by the same vendor (Aquatic Control Technology - ACT) that performs our annual spot herbicide treatments, Secchi disk readings are now also performed approximately biweekly by a LQIC member. Water clarity is impacted by many factors, such as algae, poor land use practices, erosion from rainfall and runoff, water temperature and general turbidity of the water.

- **Cyanobacteria (algae):** Cyanobacteria is also monitored by ACT in the spring and fall to help us better understand the levels of algae present in the lake, and importantly, the types of algae found. Blue green algae is of particular note as it can be toxic if it accumulates to high levels. ACT Secchi disk and phytoplankton counts are found in the annual report they provide to POALH at the end of each lake season. The 2014 report is on the POALH website (lakehaywardct.com/docs/ag_2014.pdf).

While each of the above measures are important on their own, their value is heightened when analyzed in combination with each other, and when analyzed over time to look for patterns and trends. Expanding the monitoring programs in 2015 will greatly enhance our future ability to understand our lake and improve management of it going forward.

The LQIC will continue to manage the monitoring program, and potentially further expand it if it appears necessary. Please feel free to reach out to LQIC with questions or comments relative to the monitoring program or any of its initiatives.
