#### Third Beach closes Sept. 3 for dredging; boat removal needed

The POALH dredging project at Third Beach will be moving forward at a quick pace after the upcoming Labor vided on the North and South Day holiday.

The beach will be closed on Sept. 3 and remain closed until May 1, 2020. There will be caution tape surrounding the work area as well as signage designating that the beach will be closed for the duration of work.

#### THIRD BEACH

Limited space will be prosides of the work area to allow those who need to remove their watercraft from the racks to access their boats. If possible, please remove your boat prior to the Labor Day holiday.

To that end, the gate on the chain link fence will also be

locked as of Sept. 3. Please do not enter the work area and respect the need for the work area to be free of foot traffic. There will be contractor equipment on the beach that must not be touched. Every effort will be made by the respective contractor to leave the equipment in a safe location and in an inoperable condition when not in use. #### Prevention is the key component to keep the lake clean of any algae blooms

In undisturbed watersheds, nature purifies water flowing into lakes. When we alter watersheds to clear land and build houses, we impair the process of natural purification. Therefore, we all must assume the responsibility for maintaining water quality. This has always been important and never has that been more evident as we hear reports on bodies of water suffering from algae blooms.

Excessive phosphorus is the primary cause of degraded lake water quality and unfortunately most of that can be caused by runoff. And although it may promote plant growth on our properties, it also promotes algae growth. The most effective way to deal with algae is to prevent it. As an association we can ask our board and various committees to help in the preven-

tion of lake quality problems, but without individual community members doing their part this can become a monumental task. A flyer produced by the state of New York contains very concise information on how we all can do our part. As you all are aware by now, your Lake Quality Improvement Committee has an ongoing water quality testing protocol in place. We will also help to develop a Lake Hayward algae action plan, in case of a bloom, to present to the board. This plan would work in conjunction with local

health officials. In the meantime, please educate yourselves on the possible harmful effects of algae and how you can prevent them. There is plenty of information to be found on the Internet. As we all probably know by now, they are particularly dangerous for animals.

These LQIC newsletter articles do their best to be timely and topical. This one was written on Aug. 15 to meet a submission deadline early because of vacation plans by its author.

We hope that any questions you may have had were answered at the association annual meeting on Aug. 18 or will be. Any future questions regarding water quality should be addressed to the board and they, in turn, will find the best way to have them answered.


#### Barbershop quartet on Aug. 31
